Report from the 2004 Parliament of World Religions

Joel Morwood, Jennifer Knight, and Tom McFarlane, three members of the Center's board of directors, recently represented the Center at the Parliament of the World's Religions which was held July 7-13, 2004, in Barcelona, Spain. The Parliament is a major interreligious conference attracting thousands of participants representing religious traditions and organizations from all over the world. Formal events included shared worship, interreligious dialogue, workshops, symposia, sacred art and music performances, and panel discussions, all centered around ways to foster peace through the wisdom of listening to others with different points of view and the power of commitment to putting universal spiritual values into action. In addition to attending the formal programs at the Parliament, Joel, Jennifer, and Tom also met informally with a few of the other participants.

Digital Mastery Attained

We are pleased to announce that Center's entire collection of Joel's recorded talks, as well as those of our guest speakers, have been digitally re-mastered and are now available in both CD and cassette tape formats. The two people primarily responsible for carrying out this project were Damien Pierce and Jennifer Knight. Over a two-year period Damien converted more than 150 taped talks into digital computer files. Each talk was then dynamically compressed, and noise and hiss reduction filters were applied. Finally, the voices of members of the audience who asked questions or contributed to the discussions were amplified so they could be more easily understood. For her part, Jennifer created a database to track the re-mastered talks, designed and printed labels for the new CDs and their cases, and wrote up new checkout cards for the library copies. Thanks to both of you for a job well done!

The members of the 2003–04 Foundation Studies Group have completed their year of studying and practicing the basic teachings of the mystics, and are welcomed into the Center's community of practitioners. Often the greatest contributions take place silently and diligently behind the scenes. Such is the case with Mike Craven, who has recently retired from his six-year post as production editor for the *Center Voice* newsletter (the first year of which he also served as managing editor). With gratitude for his countless hours of work on newsletter layout during the production of twelve newsletter issues and his valuable combination of artistic talent and attention to detail, we extend to Mike our deep appreciation.

News About the Newsletter

To better serve its readers with more timely information and news, the Center's newsletter is now being published three times a year instead of just twice a year. In addition, the newsletter will no longer include large articles or interviews, but will focus instead on brief news items, activities at the Center, and book reviews. As always, it will contain a calendar of events and current publication catalog as well. To reflect this change to a more streamlined newsletter directed primarily to our local community, the newsletter name has changed from Center Voice to Center Community News. In addition, Tom McFarlane has turned over the job of managing editor to Vip Short, who will bring his unique style to the newsletter. A related development is the Center's plans to launch a new electronic journal, Holos: Forum for a New Worldview, which will be edited by Tom McFarlane. Intended for a worldwide audience, the Holos journal will contain original, in-depth articles and interviews like those that formerly appeared in Center Voice. The first issue is currently in production and is planned for publication in early 2005. Like the newsletter, the journal will be available in electronic form on the Center's website.

Spring 2004 Retreat

The five-day spring retreat, entitled *Beginner's Mind*, was led by Joel Morwood and Tom McFarlane and took place April 16-21 at the Cloud Mountain Retreat Center near Castle Rock, Washington. Step by step, retreatants were led through the cultivation of *shamatha* (calm abiding) and *vipasshyna* (choiceless awareness.)

Practice Notes from a Whacked Pupil

The following proposal was made by Wesley Lachman during the students' reporting session at the end of the 2004 CSS spring retreat at Cloud Mountain Retreat Center. It was inspired by our teacher's practice of whacking veteran students with a verbal stick when they asked inappropriate questions during teaching sessions.

Student questions that may cause difficulty may be classified as WMD or UFO questions. Either kind may be a perfectly good question and yet become the occasion for unintended consequences.

The WMD question is any question which elicits a WMD response from the teacher, as in "Won't Make a Difference." This may be followed with:

"How would it help you to know the answer to this?!!"

And this may be followed by a taunt, and then:

"I'm not going to tell you even if I know the answer because this will just feed your donkey mind and it will start spinning and you will never find the path!"

And that may be followed by:

"But I will say one thing..." followed by a threeminute lecture of which you understand nothing because you are so unnerved by being whacked in the first place.

I think we can improve the situation in the following manner: When any one of us can hear someone beginning to launch a WMD question, we know there is nothing we can do for them. In a few seconds they are going to be asking themselves, "Why did I ask this question?" And, more deeply, "Why would anyone ask this question?" This is an excellent inquiry and it will be even more effective if asked before launch.

But if you see a WMD being launched, you can warn the rest of us. Just whisper, "WMD!" or perhaps, "Incoming!" to the person seated next to you and pass it on down the line. With any luck we can get the rest of us alerted before the thing detonates, so we can drop and cover. Sensitive people like Cathy may want to actually cover their ears during the impact.

The other classification of questions that may cause unintended consequences is the UFO. The UFO question is any question that can be answered by "You find out!" Thus, UFO. This is usually followed by:

"Trust your own experience!" and

"Why are you asking me these questions?!" or

"Go and practice and find out for yourself!"

Most UFOs will detonate even more resolutely than the average WMD, so the use of the early warning system described above applies here too, only more so.

As a footnote it should be noted that errors are sometimes made. Our dear teacher, being over 60 years of age and with impaired eyesight, may occasionally squeeze off a couple of rounds at a UFO which is still on the launch pad. This is not his fault. I believe that he is doing the best he can.

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
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MISSION AND PROGRAMS

The Center publishes a newsletter containing community news, upcoming programs, book reviews, and other information and resources related to the Center's mission.

The Center for Sacred Sciences is a non-profit, tax-exempt church based in Eugene, Oregon, USA. We rely chiefly on volunteer labor to support our programs, and on public donations and membership pledges to meet our operating expenses. Our spiritual director gives his teachings freely as a labor of love and receives no financial compensation from the Center.
